National Council of Churches in Australia (NCCA) Report on Forum

Elizabeth Vagg represented the TCC at the 6th NCCA Forum in Queensland in July. The theme of the Forum was drawn from Pastor Dietrich Bonhoeffer's book, "Life Together".

The opening address considered the role of the NCCA in working towards unity of the churches. The NCCA is about witnessing to the Church and the world that we are ONE in Christ and that this unity is God's will and integral to the new creation. Because of human weakness, we have broken this unity; the NCCA is a means to bring the members together. It is a faith-centred tool of the Churches, but does not replace the Church. Its goal is unity, not the NCCA itself. It must listen to the churches, remember God's faithfulness, discover what works, and draw on underutilized resources. Tolerance is not sufficient. The challenge is to foster dialogue, to contribute to common platforms, interacting with Governments on relevant issues and to walk with the vulnerable, in solidarity. These concepts hold true of the TCC also.

The public address was given by Monsignor Don Bolen, from the Pontifical Council for the Promotion of Christian Unity. His talk also centred on Bonheoffer's theme of Life Together. He spoke of an Ecumenism of Truth, an Ecumenism of Love and a Spiritual Ecumenism. The first requires a dialogue to reach agreed statements on points of consensus. Many of the theological issues which kept us apart have been resolved. The NCCA Covenant model is a good model for ecumenism at this level. The Ecumenism of Love involves a growing respect and drawing together in our lives, as we work, pray and live together. Spiritual Ecumenism involves prayer, worship, study and witness. It seeks to build a community based on the Sermon on the Mount, living out the gospel intently.



Jesus: All About Life (JAAL) (a prime-time media campaign developed by the Bible Society in New South Wales).is happening in Tasmania from 12 September to 30 October.

- It aims to motivate Christians to share their faith.
- It is thought provoking, challenging the ordinary person with Jesus and his life
- It is a series of advertisements that are contemporary, sharp and strategically focused, each presenting the values of Jesus and his teachings in a way that has proven to generate thought and discussion among viewers.

A key part of the JAAL campaign is the involvement of local churches. **Your** church can be involved at two levels: firstly, through a financial contribution to help buy media time; and secondly, by running local events that help your church members reach out to their friends, relatives and neighbours. The JAAL team encourages you to talk with other Christian leaders in your community to consider how to partner with their churches to use this opportunity. Up to a few days ago, 186 registrations had been received from a wide spectrum of denominational groups.

The *Media Launch* of the campaign will be held at 10.00 am on Monday 10 September at the Door of Hope church, cnr. Glen Dhu & Heather Streets, Launceston.

DRAMATIC INCREASE IN STATE SCHOOL CHAPLAINCIES



Following the first round of Federal Government funding for School Chaplaincy positions 13 State schools were able to extend the hours of their existing chaplain or employ an additional chaplain. Of these schools 4 were Senior Colleges. In addition 20 schools were able to employ a new chaplain, some 12 of these being Primary schools. This is an exciting development and one full of potential for a more effective Christian presence in State schools in Tasmania.

Such a development has, of course, placed considerable additional pressure on Scripture Union, which acts on behalf of the Tasmanian Council of Churches, to provide professional and caring support for all these chaplains. To date, Greg Foot the part-time Chaplaincy Support Officer, has carried this load and has exercised a very fine ministry. The churches in Tasmania owe a great deal to the expertise of Greg and to Scripture Union. The "Genesis Foundation" has provided some additional funding to Scripture Union and it is hoped that

a Chaplaincy Support Officer can be appointed to serve the northern part of the State.

The story however does not end here! The second round of Federal Government submissions closed on 15 August and a further 56 schools have applied and nominated the TCC/SU as their Project Sponsor. This is an amazing response and indicates the value of this program to schools in this State. Of course, it creates significant pressure on the Commission for Christian Ministry in State Schools and Scripture Union to ensure that the chaplaincy program operates effectively.

This is a new day of opportunity for Christian ministry to young people and creates a pressing challenge to the churches to enhance the effectiveness of this ministry through prayer and practical support.

2007 TCC ANNUAL MEETING

On Saturday 12 May last the Annual Meeting of the Tasmanian Council of Churches was held. The Rev'd Professor Christiaan Mostert was the keynote speaker for the occasion. He used the theme *Called to be the One Church* for his address. The title was taken from a Text on Ecclesiology which the World Council of Churches' 9th Assembly addressed to the churches – an invitation to the Churches to renew their commitment to the Search for Unity and to deepen their Dialogue. Dr. Mostert explored the importance of unity, dialogue, the nature and mission and doctrine of the church and concluded by pointing out the importance of Councils of Churches. He urged members to consider that churches do need each other, do need encouragement and enrichment from each other, do need to be in relationships of mutual accountability with each other, and do need time to reflect on their faith and life together. Councils of churches are uniquely placed to help this happen.


